WELCOME

Serving as Mayor last year has been absolutely marvellous, I have kept you updated through this newsletter with some of my engagements as the year has gone on and here we are, the first year over. I was very pleased to be re-elected by my fellow Councillors for the second year of office at Mayor Making on 8 May and I fully intend to make the most of the opportunity to promote the town both from within and from outside.

My Mayor's Charity last year was The Creek Trust, in recognition of their sterling efforts to raise £125,000 as a part payment towards the extra costs to install a swing bridge, as opposed to the fixed bridge which was within Kent County Council's budget to undertake this year. A plan to raise funds from the public, Swale Borough Council and Faversham Town Council to help fund the upgrade to a proper swing bridge was put together and the fundraising began. In 5 months they had reached their target and their deadline. The Creek Neighbourhood Plan has been working its way through the processes this year – first the official Inspector had to approve it – that was done but with one quite major change which then triggered a Judicial Review. That has now been judged upon and the plan became ready to go to referendum which took place on 4 May. We hope that a successful outcome will mean that we can soon have a working swing bridge and sluice gates to bring the upper basin back into use.

As my year finished, I was able to donate £3,000 to the Creek Trust, £500 to the Nautical Festival and £250 to the David Smiley Bursary Fund at the Tennis Club.

This year I have chosen two principal charities, the Faversham Carnival Association and Faversham Christmas Lights. In both cases for the reasons that firstly, they bring joy to immense numbers of Faversham people and secondly, to honour the long-serving people who work tirelessly year after year to put on the show.

KALC Community Award 2017 Faversham Hero

Mary Caryer, recently retired Chair of the Arden Theatre Group, was recognised for her work to the arts in Faversham at this year's Annual Town Meeting. COMMUNITY LAND TRUSTS

This is something that I have been looking at for a number of months. I think now is the time to share it and ask for your comments. Please take the time to read this article. I think it is a great concept and one that we should look at seriously for Faversham. So.....

What are Community Land Trusts?

There are over 225 Community Land Trusts (CLTs) countrywide and they are popping up all over the place. Our nearest two are The Isle of Sheppey and Cranbrook. To date CLTs have developed over 700 permanently affordable houses and will have developed another 3,000 homes by 2020. CLTs can provide long-term solutions to a variety of local needs, be that affordable housing, public spaces, local economy or social and community enterprises.

A Community Land Trust can be set up by a variety of bodies from the local parish council to a group of professionals or even property developers. There is a very clear and definitive set of criteria that the CLT must follow, but the underlying principle of it, is that it aims to serve the community interests as well as the individual interest.

Why set up a Community Land Trust?

House prices are continually rising, private rents are soaring. People who work in our town are finding it harder to live in our town. It has become a victim of its' own success, with the great rail and road accesses into London.

This is a new idea for us, but not an altogether new concept. There is a long history of community ownership/management in this country. For example: the original Garden Cities had a community trust that owned and managed the assets on behalf of the community.

How it Works

We would need to form a steering group, including individuals with specific skill sets i.e. architects, solicitors financial advisors etc. Then, if the project progresses, the steering group will become the founding board of the CLT. The group will need to decide on what projects it would lead and targets it would wish to achieve such as to develop affordable housing to enable young Faversham families to live and work in their town.

Next is the action plan: get initial support, hold a public meeting, create a membership base, the CLT's legal structure, start looking at sites, collecting evidence of the housing need engaging with developers / housing associations and open a bank account and start fund raising.

FAVERSHAM TOWN TWINNING ASSOCIATION

In early April Faversham' Mayor Cllr Shiel Campbell attended Hazebrouck's mid-Lent celebrations. La Fête de la Mi-Carême (Carême = Lent) is a traditional Catholic festival dating from the Middle-Ages. Originally celebrated on the third Tuesday of Lent (i.e.Mardi Gras), when people were allowed to **faire gras** (= eat well) on that day as opposed to **faire maigre** (= to fast). Nowadays it is celebrated on the third Thursday in Lent and is extended to the weekend.

In Hazebrouck a few traditions have developed around the Mi-Carême celebrations:

La Fête du Lièvre (The Hare Festival) In Flemish, the language traditionally spoken in Flanders, Hazebrouck means "hare marsh" Originally, a hare was thrown from the Town Hall balcony for people to catch in exchange for a prize but this custom was cancelled in 1539 as it caused much confusion and many fights. Now the custom has been revived and this year the Mayor of Hazebrouck, Bernard deBaecker (pictured below with Mayor Shiel Campbell on his left) threw soft toy hares from the Town Hall balcony

Le lancer de noix: (The throwing of walnuts) This started as a sort of compensation for the suppression of the hare catching. Walnuts, which can easily be kept through winter were thrown in the market place. This tradition has been kept to this day. It is said that walnuts given out on that day will bring you good luck throughout the year.

It is expected that a formal invitation will be issued to Hazebrouck inviting the Mayor and his colleagues to visit Faversham on the Hop Festival weekend.

12 MARKET PLACE

The Project to establish a new Town Hall for the Town and to create a world class Museum to have exhibitions to attract additional visitors to Faversham continues.

Architects have applied for Planning Permission, on behalf of the Town Council, for alterations to the building to create an accessible first floor Town Council Office and a Seminar Room and storage facilities. On the ground floor there will be a permanent exhibitions centre, an area for a rotating display. There will also be a room for the presentations of films and other audio visual presentations. At all stages consideration of security and climatic conditions are paramount. There will also be the possibility of community use of the building for some of the year.

During the month exploratory visits have been made to Kent Archives in Maidstone and the new Sandwich Town Council Museum.

The timetable is:

June 2017 Invitations to tender sent to builders

July 2017 Planning Permission obtained

September 2017 Builders appointed

February 2018 Building work complete

March 2018 Town Council Office opens
